4 CLUB FUND RAISING AND FELLOWSHIP SOCIAL SOCCER COMPETITION

One day I overheard a Rotarian who had just been asked for a personal contribution to a charitable project complaining that when long ago he had joined Rotary he was assured that he would not be asked to give money himself but to raise it from others. Well he and all others who think like him now have the chance to put their policy in action: -

The four Presidents Soccer Shield competition will be held some time early in the new year. (Date to be advised) The Bulawayo Rotary clubs social soccer competition is being organized with the approval of D.G. Eric and four Presidents of Bulawayo Rotary clubs.

Rt. Ally De Souza (Bulawayo Rotary Club PRO officer) has been appointed as liaison officer this year with PP's Eric Rensburg (Bulawayo Club) and Peter Edmeades (Bulawayo South Club), being their usual proactive selves, not only are they keeping an eye on the organisers but are also using their powers of persuasion on every Rotarian to take part.

How does the Social Soccer Competition work?

The Bulawayo Rotary clubs Social Soccer competition is a four club project, and will be an annual event. The event is an opportunity for each Rotary club to raise money for it's own favorite charity, to have great fun and fellowship in Rotary. A chance to stop the President, Ann President and project chairperson from moaning about thee members lack of support for his/her pet project. The four clubs will take turns in organising the event. The organising club will charge entry fees to cover the cost of running the event.

Bulawayo Rotary Club has donated the shield. To enter a club needs to pay \$250.00 and a further \$20.00 per head for a team of not less than 15 players. The entry fees are to cover the cost of running the event, much of which will be in the experienced hands of TEAM-SPIRIT who will supply soccer balls, first aid kit, stretchers, doctors, referees, legal practitioners (in the event of disputed goals), video facilities and insurance etc.

All Rotarians whether intending to play or not should seek sponsorship for their clubs chosen charity.

Here Is A Tip On How To Go About Sponsorship

"We are taking part in this extremely tuff and strenuous once per year soccer competition. It really is a clash of the GIANTS. Clubs will clash against each other three times that day. Will you sponsor me or our soccer team?" All the money raised will go to XYZ charity or what ever your clubs chosen charity. By the way, the extremely tuff strenuous clash of the giants is only to impress your potential sponsors. The truth is social soccer is as fun and relaxed as you want to make it.

Registration of players.

Each participating Rotary club will be registered and field a soccer team of 15-20 players – Rotarians, Rotary Ann's, family, friends or what ever. Each team is likely to play at least three times that day from 9.30am to 2.30pm. The guest of honor A.D.G. Malcolm Ross will present the winning team with the prize money and shield.
