# **MATOBO HILLS**

The July 2001 edition of THE ROTARIAN reports on Rotary's key role in adding the City of Lyon, France, to UNESCO's list of 690 World Heritage Sites. The 2000-year-old city was founded by the Romans and now illustrates the exceptional way in which progress and the evolution of architectural design and town planning over many centuries. The Rotary Club of Lyon produced a video of the city's historical treasures.

In the last few weeks, the Bulawayo community has been involved in the combined effort of the Department of National Parks and Wild Life, the Department of National Museums and Monuments and the Matobo Conservation Society - supported by a technical committee, to apply to the World Heritage Committee for the Matobo Hills to be declared a World Heritage site. If this application is successful, it will join Khami Ruins, Great Zimbabwe, Mana Pools and Victoria Falls on the list of Zimbabwe's World Heritage sites. Not only would a successful application bring a positive impact for long-term job creation and growth of the tourist industry in Bulawayo, but recognises the importance of Africa heritage in the global context and will develop the preservation, conservation and management of the rich archaelogical deposits, flora and fauna of the hills. The Matobo submission is based on a unique mixture of anthropology, rock art, birds of prey, geology, flora and fauna, spiritual and historical values. A dossier will be submitted to UNESCO representing the findings of many years of scientific research, detailed maps and documentary film together with a proposed management plan.

Matobo Hills are on our doorstep. How many of us take the advantage of regular visits? How many of us have seen the remains of the old railway station near Matobo Police Station reflecting past facilities for Bulawayo residents to enjoy a trip to the hills?

I can recall the unusual and enjoyable Presidential Induction lunch of the late Ray Simpson out at Gordon Park in 1989 with Rotarian Noel Scott leading a service beforehand and a braai lunch following. Is it not time we had another organised visit to the Matopos?

The City of Lyons is only two thousand years old; The Matobo Hills are four billion. Are we taking advantage of this unique site on our doorstep, Rotarians Noel and Odilo are captive visitors. How about the rest of us?

AIR - Majority of International flights are from Harare, Lusaka & Joburg. Flights from Nairobi land at Chileka Airport, Blantyre. Likewise many flights also land at Lilongwe International Airport. Connecting flights (in smaller aircrafts) from both these airports to Mangochi (air field closest to Conference venue). Flight details to be obtained from your travel agent closer to dates of Conference.

We are aware of the distances and travel times. If possible, it is advisable for participants to plan their journey such as to enable them reach the conference venue

before dark on Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2002. However, if time or circumstances preclude you from doing this, then kindly arrange overnight accommodation in Blantyre or Lilongwe on Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2002 and travel early morning to conference venue. # **Membership Workshock – Harare 4<sup>th</sup> August, 2001**

The Membership Workshock in Harare followed a highly participative brainstorming format answering a series of posed questions. These notes therefore should be read in conjunction with the Power Point Presentation entitled Membership Development:

#### Why do we need new members?

Important for Rotary Clubs are enough members for projects in serving mankind as well as for fellowship

#### New Members also:

- > Lower the average age of aging clubs
- > Bring new ideas and energy to tired clubs
- > Provide a pool of future leadership for clubs and district
- > Allow for attrition

#### Why does RI need new members?

Clubs accept that new members provide a source for important extra contributions for the Rotary Foundation thus swelling funds for more Matching Grants

RI President Rick Kings impassioned plea for Clubs and individual Rotarians to fulfill the Global Quest for "one new member per month, net five" in answer to the:

- ➤ Loss of members since 1995/96 to 2000 for the first time since World War Two and after the Wall Street Crash in 1929
- ➤ Goal of 1.5 million Rotarians worldwide by Rotary's Centenary in 1905

#### What will attract new members?

Workshock participants recognised the importance of making their clubs essentially attractive for new members. New members are looking for:

- > Self fulfillment through service
- > Self enlightenment
- > Self development
- > Friendship and fellowship
- > Opportunities to do meaningful service to their communities

New members want to join successful Rotary Clubs as "Success breeds Success"

Rotary does not publicise its service successes enough for members to be automatically attracted to becoming a member. The Internationality of Rotary is important to publicise. And some potential members only need to be asked!

#### What is an effective rotary Club?

Participants accepted that Rotarians should critically analyse whether their Clubs are effective and attractive enough to bring in the new members they need and retain members already in clubs. One way to make every Rotarian aware is to ask

Would you join your club now?

The workshock noted Rick King's call

To develop and improve clubs and the suggested District 9210 five point plan Strategies for increasing new members

Centrally to the workshock was the development by delegates of strategies for increasing new members

- > An excellent example of a winning strategy is Msasa Rotary Club's "One from Two" strategy with each Rotarian paired off the by the Membership Rotarian (PDG Derrick McDiarmid) and allocated a month in which to bring in their new member
- > Classification comparisons between clubs will draw attention to gaps especially of skills to fulfill particular Club projects The meeting noted Rotary's new structure of only two types of membership Active and Honorary and that Clubs can induct up to five members per classification.
- ➤ Advertising Rotary's achievement was accepted as essential and even advertising for members was supported. The eight Harare clubs resolution to seriously strategise a comprehensive Public Relations campaign during Rotary Awareness Month in January 2002 was strongly endorsed.
- ➤ Rotaract and alumni from GSE and Youth Exchange were adjudged fertile grounds for new members although very neglected. The meeting endorsed the need for rotary to educate Interactors and Rotaractors about Rotary so that eventual membership of Rotary becomes a natural progression. Round Table was another potential source of new members.
- **Lady members for two of the Harare Clubs present were highlighted.**

**Rotary International's Strategies for Increasing New Members** 

Workshock participants were particularly interested in RI's strategy to pursue:

Future leaders for the Rotary World where clubs invite 3 future leaders in the two age groups 20 to 29 and 30 to 35 to become Honorary members for 6 months and recommending the most pressing needs in the community for the club to service with their involvement before joint as full members.

Also of interest was the strategy amongst DG's Other Ideas

- > Fellowship and Family Involvement whereby potential Rotarians and their families are invited by clubs to fellowship functions and service projects to learn about Rotary in conductive surroundings where they will be more receptive
- Member Orientation before Receiving Rotary Pins was also debated. The need for in depth orientation and induction in a formal and dignified manner is considered essential. A comprehensive package for new members and an active mentor (not necessarily the introducer) are also highly recommended. The wearing of Rotary pins with pride all the time is also strongly urged.

> There was also interest in the suggestion that PDGs be assigned to help "Weak Clubs" but questions were raised as to who decides what Clubs are weak? and What criteria are used to define weakness in Clubs?

[NB After meeting note: Past District Governors Derrick McDiarmid and Eric Marques together with DG Rafiq Nathanie and DGE Peter Johnston are encouraged to debate the issue and decide on possible action]

"How to retain members?" was well debated:

- > Involve member in meaningful service projects in Rotary is essential
- ➤ Make club meeting interesting with good speakers addressing relevant issues
- > Encourage longer serving members to inspire members with their experiences
- > Promote the idea of make-ups at the other Clubs especially when traveling out of town to learn how diverse and different Rotary is around the world
- Motivate RINOS (Rotarians in name only) or badgers (those who wear the rotary badge only) i.e. Badger the badgers
